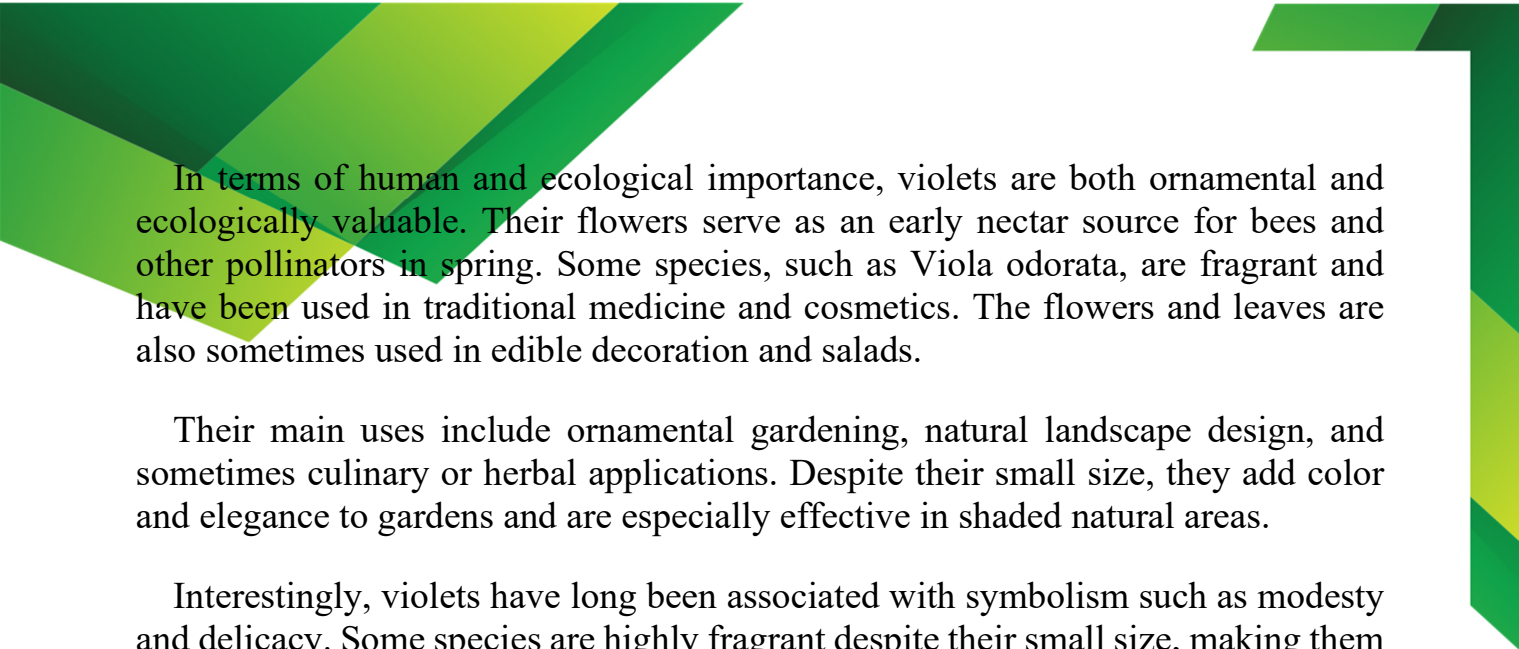
Viola (Viola)

Viola is a genus of flowering plants commonly known as **violet** or “pansy/violet” in everyday language. It includes perennial, biennial, and sometimes annual species. These plants are known for their small, delicate, and often fragrant flowers. Each flower typically has five petals and a symmetrical shape. Their colors vary widely, including purple, blue, yellow, white, and mixed shades.



Viola species are mainly distributed across temperate regions of the Northern Hemisphere. They are commonly found in forest edges, meadows, and partially shaded or shady habitats. In Azerbaijan, violets are often seen in nature and gardens during spring and are among the most beloved spring flowers.

These plants prefer cool and humid conditions. They grow best in sunny or semi-shaded areas but may weaken in very hot weather. The soil should be humus-rich and moisture-retentive. Many species bloom in spring and autumn. Some types spread through creeping rhizomes and can form ground cover.



In terms of human and ecological importance, violets are both ornamental and ecologically valuable. Their flowers serve as an early nectar source for bees and other pollinators in spring. Some species, such as *Viola odorata*, are fragrant and have been used in traditional medicine and cosmetics. The flowers and leaves are also sometimes used in edible decoration and salads.

Their main uses include ornamental gardening, natural landscape design, and sometimes culinary or herbal applications. Despite their small size, they add color and elegance to gardens and are especially effective in shaded natural areas.

Interestingly, violets have long been associated with symbolism such as modesty and delicacy. Some species are highly fragrant despite their small size, making them culturally and horticulturally significant plants.
